The discussion began on updated and new projects. Oruba spoke about funding available at Humber College for projects. It is possible that R2:1 could partner on a project for her students. Various examples of projects were discussed as well as important aspects of how a project be put together. Community connections and indigenous centres, as well as mass timber were brought up as examples and issues. It was agreed that Oruba will share the funding information and the application process when she gets it from Humber.

Elaine announced her new project with TTL (Transformational Teaching and Learning) at University of New Brunswick. She will create a project to instruct and encourage professors across faculties to include climate change and climate adaptation into their courses. This is a long-term effort. Elaine will update as she goes along.

Oruba discussed her sabbatical project. It has yet to be finalized but hopes to spend time in Europe, specifically Italy. It may involve climate change, architecture, and biodiversity. She also mentioned a new professor in engineering at Humber who would like to join R2:1
